Aims

At **The King's C of E Primary Academy**, we believe that all pupils can and should take pride in their work, taking care to make it the best it can be. We believe that this is key to raising a child's self-confidence, improving their attitude to learning and ultimately their outcomes.

The role of adults

- Teach handwriting three times a week and encourage best practice for a tripod grip and good sitting. (TNT (Tummy near table, BBC (Bottom back of chair) and 6 legs flat on the floor)
- Teach drawing skills that can be applied to illustrate pieces of work
- Make sure that all children understand how the academy expects them to present their work.
- Lead by example by making sure their work, like classroom displays, are always tidy and showcase well-presented pupils' work.
- Make sure that all children have all the equipment they need, such as guidelines when writing on plain paper, to ensure that your work is as tidy as it can be. Guidelines are lined pieces of paper that you can put underneath plain paper to help you write in a straight line.

Writing equipment

All children write with a sharpened pencil.


Children are rewarded with a 'pen licence' and a rollerball pen when they show that they have the skills to write consistently well.

When a child's handwriting is of an excellent quality, they are awarded with a fountain pen.

Pencils and black ink are the only tools used for illustrative work in curriculum books and work for display.

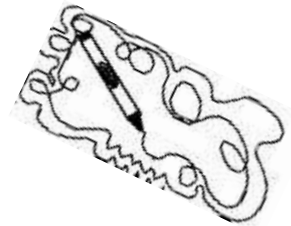

Pupil presentation promise

A pupil presentation promise is a promise between you and your teacher which says that you will do what they ask, to make sure your work is smart and tidy. You promise to:



- Write all work in pencil, unless the teacher says you can use pen.
- Draw all sketches and diagrams using a pencil.
- Always make sure to write on the line, starting at the margin and writing to the end of the line, leaving a finger space between words.
- Never use rubbers, instead neatly cross-out any mistakes using a single line drawn with a ruler.
- Never use correction fluid.
- Leave a single line between paragraphs.
- Write the date in its long form, for example, Wednesday 6th December in all work except for maths books where we write the date in number for 6.12.19.
- Always write the date on the top line of the right-hand corner and underline it neatly using a ruler.
- Write out the lesson's learning objectives under the date, leaving a single line space in between the lesson objective and the date and underlining them using a ruler, when your teacher tells you to.
- Start new pieces of work by leaving a single line space between the new work and the last piece of work – separating the two with a straight line drawn with a ruler.
- Always try to make your handwriting as neat as possible.
- Never doodle or scribble in any of your notebooks.
- Always use a ruler when drawing diagrams and graphs.
- Always be tidy when cutting and sticking is needed, making sure things are cut straight and stuck into exercise books neatly.
- Always make sure that homework is of the same standard as any work produced in lessons.



If you keep your promise, your teacher could put your work on display! If you don't keep your promise, your teacher may ask you to write out your work again to make it smart and tidy.
